MetroWest is owned by its members and managed by the MetroWest Master Association (MWMA), which has the overall responsibility and right in maintaining the standards of all common areas located within the community. MWMA's mission is to maintain a harmonious sense of community for the diverse cultural neighborhood of families, professionals, students and businesses. MetroWest strives to be the premiere community of Orlando through quality schooling, thriving businesses, visual aesthetics, and community building activities.

MetroWest is a 1,805-acre masterplanned community, developed in the 1980s by Debra, Inc., an Orlando-based developer, as a business, commercial and residential community — a place where people can live, work, play and connect. Housing options in the community include a range of single-family homes



with several apartment, townhome and condominium complexes spread over the gently rolling landscape. The community has swelled to over 10,000 residential units, 1.4 million square feet of office space and 762,444 square feet of retail and restaurant space.

MetroWest Public Safety Corner

Catalytic converter thefts are on the rise nationally and in Orlando. What is a catalytic converter? A catalytic converter is part of your vehicle's exhaust system that's located underneath your vehicle. It acts as a catalyst for converting pollutant gases into less harmful ones.

Why are they so valuable? Catalytic converts contain precious metals such as platinum, palladium and rhodium. Platinum is trading at \$970 per ounce, palladium is \$1,330 an ounce and rhodium is \$10,000 per ounce. That means these thieves are making a killing off of each catalytic converter they steal.

How can you protect yourself? The experts recommend parking your vehicle in a garage if possible; if you don't have a garage then park in a well-lit area. There are also anti-theft devices you can buy ranging from \$30-\$90. Make sure you report suspicious activity and keep an eye out for anyone lingering near vehicles at night.


music, fireworks, food trucks, rides, vendors, and adult beverages for sale. No ticket of any kind is required.

Amber began her career in 2011 at the South Daytona Police Department working patrol for four years. Her responsibilities

included enforcing traffic laws, responding to calls for service, working undercover during large events such as Bike Week and Race Week, and participating in community events.

In April 2015, Amber joined the Seminole County Sheriff's Office and received her first award for working with troubled juveniles after only six months. After two years of working patrol, Amber received a lateral movement into the Public Affairs Division where she specialized in crime prevention, community events and public engagement. Amber's team

received the Crime Prevention Unit of the Year award from the state of Florida, as well as several other awards for her work with the community.

In 2019, Amber was promoted to the rank of Sergeant, returning to patrol to begin a new path in leadership and spending three years supervising a shift of 10 deputies. She attended several supervisory and leadership courses including Cultivating Leaders in law Enforcement, Incident Command, National Staff and Command College, and Leadership Philosophies for Leadership and Planning.

In fall 2022, Amber decided to pursue what she is most passionate about: crime prevention and community engagement. Leave Fireworks to the Professionals

Following are some fireworks that are legal for consumers to purchase and use in some states. But just because they are legal doesn't mean they're safe.

- Sparklers Sparklers can quickly ignite clothing, and many children have received severe burns from dropping sparklers on their feet.
- **Bottle Rockets** Bottle rockets can cause chest, head and eye injuries.
- **Firecrackers** They can cause burns and other serious injuries.
- Roman Candles There have been numerous reports of children losing fingers, severe burns and other injuries, which are sometimes caused when the device gets jammed.
- M-class Fireworks They are produced illegally and without quality control, have short fuses and cause hundreds of extremely severe injuries each year.
